## **Chinese currency**

Search the internet to find the answers to the following questions as quickly as you can.

- 1. In China, the currency is made up of yuan and jiao.
- 2. 1 Chinese yuan is equal to 15 cents / \$0.15 in Australian currency\*.
- 3. 1 Australian dollar is equal to <u>6.6</u> Chinese yuan\*.
- 4. 1 jiao is one tenth of a yuan and is worth about 1.5 cents in Australian currency\*.
- 5. The symbol for the Australian dollar is \$. The symbol for Yuan is 2.
- 6. In Australia, we have a \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100 note. What are the different notes available in China?
  - 1 yuan, 5 yuan, 10 yuan, 20 yuan, 50 yuan and 100 yuan
- 7. The informal way of referring to yuan in China is 'kuai'.
