


Pulguksa Temple

Pulguksa is one of Korea's most famous Buddhist temples. It is known as the 'Temple of the Buddha Land'. The temple was completed in AD 751, during the reign of the Shilla Kingdom.

The temple is famous for its magnificently painted wooden buildings and stone pagodas and stairways. A pagoda is a tower built as a temple or a monument. It is divided into several stories usually with roofs curving upward at the corners of each storey.

Many wooden pagodas were built at the temple, but only two granite pagodas remain today. *Tabot'ap '*Pagoda of Many Treasures' and *Sokkat'ap '*Pagoda of the Buddha' are on the left and right of the temple's main courtyard.





The 'Pagoda of Many Treasures' is an elaborate building which represents the Buddha's rise to heaven. The 'Pagoda of the Buddha' has a much simpler design and represents the Buddha's travels to the earthly world.

Two stone stairways lead to the temple grounds. The stairways are called bridges and are symbols of the path from earth to the Buddhist paradise. Each stairway has 33 steps, representing the 33 heavens of Buddhism.



Sokkuram Grotto

Sokkuram Grotto is an artificial cave which houses a magnificently carved, six-metre tall stone Buddha. It is situated a couple of kilometres from the Pulguksa Temple, on the side of a mountain.

The Buddha of Sokkuram is said to be one of the finest examples of Buddhist sculpture in the world. Its gentle face and smooth flowing robes are said to give people a feeling of peace and spiritual tranquillity. Many people have studied the Buddha and the Grotto, and have commented on the remarkable mathematical precision used in the construction of the building and the placement of the main sculpture.

The World Heritage
Committee decided in 1995
to include Sokkuram Grotto on
the World Heritage List. The Committee
considers Sokkuram Grotto to be a masterpiece
of Buddhist art.
